Alumni Engagement and Networking Project

1. PROJECT REPORT

1.1. Description of the terms of reference and goals of the project - general introduction to the topic, ideas and the division of roles within the team.

Our project is a research about the TLU English language law BA program alumni opinions about the studies and how TLU helped them to get where they are now. Additionally, we will try to compile a list of contact information of the alumni to establish a possibility for connections and engagement in the future.

Currently, there is no information from the TLU side about internship opportunities, master's level programs students have been admitted to nor there is any information about the TLU English language law BA program student's career paths.

While Developing alumni networks is challenging and new for many regions of the world, yet alumni networks offer enormous potential and benefits to an institution and its students.¹ As noted by Ebert, Axelsson and Harbor, 'little research has been published on alumni relations development, and most papers are written from a US perspective'.² Ebert, Axelsson and Harbor go on to note that as developing alumni networks is new to Nordic universities, some administrators and faculty are reluctant to devote time and resources necessary to developing alumni networks.³

The goal of the project is to get some more insight of what the alumni's opinion of the studies was and what they are doing now. Also, we will get some information how studying bachelor's in TLU helped them in their career plans and if they did their masters and where. Moreover, useful and explanatory information is expected to be collected to obtain such knowledge that could be employed to discover internship opportunities and future work possibilities for the current and potential students of TLU English language law BA programme, both in Tallinn and Helsinki.

This project is mainly aimed for those people who are thinking of studying and considering studying in Tallinn University. The results of this project could help them to decide whether to study in Tallinn University or not. Information about companies/organizations where students from Tallinn University have done their practical training and which Universities are willing to admit TLU students for master's level studies will be beneficial for current students to successfully complete all the mandatory tasks of the curricula and continue their academic career.

We will make an anonymous questionnaire, that the alumni can answer. They will be provided with a link to the questionnaire through different social media channels. Also, the survey will contain a possibility of respondents to provide their contact information for future communication and establishment of alumni contacts list.

There are 13 participants in the project divided in two groups – Social Sciences and Law group. The roles are divided in the team so that everybody is doing something. We each decided in our first meeting who wants to do what and made a list of it. We considered also what everybody is good at. Division of tasks are presented in the section 2 in more depth.

1.2. The importance of the problem, its description and choice of methods

Currently, no alumni network of the TLU English language law BA program exists, and no data about companies/organizations where students from Tallinn University have done their practical training is maintained as well as future paths after graduating are unknown. Such information would not only help current students to successfully complete all the mandatory tasks of the curricula but also provide valuable aspects for consideration to potential students as they would be able to see what their career and academic possibilities are during and after studying at Tallinn University English language BA program both in Tallinn and Helsinki.

Lack of data and knowledge of alumni of the program is problematic because we, as students, don't really know so far what our chances to be accepted to a university to do our master's degrees are, nor do we really know what the career opportunities are, after bachelors or after a master's degree.

There has been problems connected to internship as well, for example, University does not have a network with companies/organizations/authorities that are interested to take interns from Tallinn University who could be employed by current students to find a place where to undergo obligatory practical training which is part of law curricula. Several current students struggled to find a place for an internship (there are many international students that are not familiar with the local practices and do not possess the native language requirements which can be of crucial importance when looking for internship opportunities) and had to contact several potential supervisors – some of them were not responding / not interested etc. Such practice not only takes a lot of time and increases the overall stress level of the students but also does not show the organizational aspects of the University in a positive light. If a list of companies/organizations/authorities where previous students have undergone their practical training while being Tallinn University student as well as their comments about the success or negative aspects would help current students to successfully conclude their studies and possibly gain future employment opportunities and connections while being students. Such a network would increase the overall satisfaction of the Tallinn University law study program.

Also, upon applying to continue the studies at the master's level, information about universities and study programs where alumni have studied would allow a current and potential student to better understand which universities are eager to admit students from Tallinn University. For example, Tallinn university students have even sued Helsinki University for not admitting them to master's level studies – unfortunately, unsuccessful as Administrative Court ruled that degree of law from the University of Tallinn could not be considered to provide a good enough basis for completing a master's degree in Helsinki University (see <https://www.aamulehti.fi/uutiset/art-2000007308466.html>) Knowing such and similar information connected with continuing academic education would benefit students and help them choose most appropriate study places.

Moreover, knowledge about career paths of students would be beneficial information evidencing various options present when graduating and would encourage potential students to apply to Tallinn University – they would know what to expect/ what are the possibilities if they study at this program/ what are the future employment options etc.

An Alumni network is possible of bringing various benefits to current, potential, and previous students as well as the university per se. It would increase the overall professionalism of the program itself and the university as well.

The results will tell us about the quality of the TLU English language law BA program and also about possible masters/future career aspects.

We are using an online survey which will be available for all the TLU English language law BA program alumni for answering. The alumni's will be provided with a link to the survey. Based on this survey we will be able to determine many things relating to studying in TLU and the life after bachelor's degree. The suitability of the survey is very good for this kind of project. It is anonymous and done online so it is easy for the alumni to fill it in. This way we can also get honest results. There is possibility in the survey for the respondents to leave their contact information for further networking.

Because currently there is not a complete networking channel for the TLU English language law BA program alumni (some Facebook, Instagram and LinkedIn groups exist but not all alumni is present there) would like to try to provide one.

1.3. Description of activities and reaching the stakeholders

The project outcomes are to conduct research, produce and communicate survey, interpret, and present the results and provide for platforms where current students could be connected with alumni and where networking is possible.

Social Sciences group activities:

We chose each group member's role in the first meeting. Everybody attended the first meeting and had the possibility to say what they wanted to do in the project. We created the action plan together on the first meeting day. Sirisopa created the communication channel for the team. Team leaders were chosen in the next meeting, we decided to have 3 team leaders as everybody in our group seemed to be very busy, so we thought it is better to divide the task. The midterm report and research on social sciences was done by everybody in the group. Linda got the task to do the portfolio of our group. The questionnaire was produced by Ajdina, Sofia and Rea and the questions to it were made by Tuuli, Sirisopa and Henriikka. After the questionnaire was produced it was sent to the other group for publication.

Research for the project was carried out by the whole group, for example. Ajdina researched what platform would be ideal for the questionnaire. Initially the "SurveyMonkey" platform was chosen since it seemed well fitting for our needs. However, due the limitation of 10 questions in that platform we later decided to go with the "Google Forms" platform, where you could add any number of questions and was overall better for our project.

Law group activities:

In order to fulfil the goals of the project, research about aspects relevant to the processing and using personal data and additional factors are conducted, questionnaire made, alumni contacted, data obtained and interpreted, and connection and networking platforms have to be established.

The activities of the group are:

- Researching General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR), Data collection and privacy issues when making questionnaires, Theoretical literature applicable to the subject as well as researching what other universities have done to make and maintain the alumni network.
- Restructuring the survey according to the necessary requirements
- Establishment of privacy policy annexed to the survey
- Interpretation and classification of the results of the questionnaire.
- Establishment of platforms where current students could communicate and network with alumni.
- Visualization and communication of the results.
- Promotion of the platforms.

The project activities are aimed at previous, current, future and potential students of TLU English language law BA program as well as university itself could benefit from the information obtained to better design the organisation of the study program and make it more attractive for potential students. This project is capable of increasing the overall professionalism of the program itself and the university as well.

In order to reach the respondents online communication was present. Admins of existing channels used by some of the alumni were contacted and collaborations established. The form of online communication was chosen because it was the most convenient method for reaching participants based on the needs of the project.

1.4. Sustainability of the project

This project is extremely sustainable because it is done fully online. The questionnaire will be available and answered online and all the materials for this project are online, so for example, no paper will be used. Also, the meetings for this project are online. The results will be published online so they are easily accessible for everyone interested. Also, cooperation with stakeholders is done online.

As will be presented in the results section, not all of the aims of the project were possible to reach within the timeframe of this project therefore it is suggested to continue the project. The concept established by the project should be developed further to reach all of the alumni of the TLU English language law BA program and merge the alumni network into one networking platform established already. It is also suggested to employ the survey prepared in this project by the university itself and, by using information about the graduates not available to the participants of the project but definitely maintained by the university, to further gain data and employ them to increase the professionalism of the study program. Also, coordinators, curator of the programme the head of legal studies shall be involved in the future development of the alumni network and compiling of the survey data.

1.5. Summary of the results and annexes

Within the timeframe of the project, we have managed to:

- Create the concept that can be used when continuing the project

- Do the research necessary for creation of the survey,
- create the survey and privacy policy annexed to it,
- publish the survey,
- contact several admins of existing networks to communicate the survey on their channels,
- establish Facebook page where the networking would be possible as well as where the results and additional information can be published,
- receive some responses to the survey,
- classify the results,
- prepare the list of companies/organizations where alumni have done their internship / continued the studies based on responses of the survey
- communicate the results.

We did not manage to:

- reach enough respondents – alumni of the project – to create sufficient database with contact information and data based on the responses of the survey
- create LinkedIn platform – due to lack of authority given from the university for establishment of page connected to the university
- merge several of existing platforms where some of program alumni are members into one, partly due to internal problems of the management of these platforms within the admins and partly to lack of time for fulfillment of such aim

It is necessary to / suggested to continue such tasks in future projects:

- use the concept made as foundation in further steps on the project
- obtain and contact all graduates of TLU English language law BA program
- communicate the survey to them
- create mechanism to avoid duplication of data already received
- provide for possibility of data security
- merge the existing networking channels into one
- maintain the networking channel already established and create the LinkedIn channel as well
- employ the idea of this project and concept established to other study programs of TLU as well
- involve university in the development of graduate's network and answering of survey questions

ANNEXES

1. Research

Tuulia → Data Collection and Privacy issues when making questionnaires (Survey):

Firstly, definition for the personal data: any data from where the person can be recognized in any way. It is data that can be used to identify a person directly or indirectly, such as by combining an individual data item with some other piece of data that enables identification, are personal data. Persons can be identified by their name, personal identity code or some other specific factor.

Such as: e-mail address, telephone number, IP address, positioning data, card numbers.

But then again, what is NOT personal data is for example anonymised data. Therefore, it should be analysed whether the survey includes personal data or not.

→ The General Data Protection Regulation protects personal data

Compliance with the requirements of the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) is required when processing personal data. The GDPR protects personal data regardless of the technology used for processing them. Neither does the storage method of the data matter: they can be stored in an IT system, video surveillance system or paper archive.

With regard to the applicability of data protection regulations, it is also irrelevant whether the processing of personal data has been centralised in one location or dispersed across several locations, systems or processors. The essential consideration is that the data concerning a specific individual can be obtained from the centralised or dispersed data set by certain criteria, such as the name or personal identity code. In other words, if their purpose of use is the same, the data belong to the same logical data file even if they are collected from different sources, stored in different locations or processed by different parties.

For as long as the data can be used to identify persons directly or restored to an identifiable format, they constitute personal data and are subject to the GDPR.

→ Pseudonymised and anonymised data

Pseudonymisation means the processing of personal data in such a manner that the personal data can no longer be attributed to a specific person without the use of additional information. Such additional information must be kept carefully separate from personal data. Even still this data can still be used to single individuals out and combine their data from different records, since this is still personal data and their processing is subject to data protection regulations.

The encoding of personal data is an example of pseudonymisation. Encoded data cannot be connected to a specific individual without a code key. For the holder of the code key, however, decoding the records and identifying each data subject remains a simple task. Personal data can also be protected with false names. For example, a data item related to the individual can be replaced with another in a database. Pseudonymisation is a commonly employed method in research and statistics.

Anonymised data

Anonymisation refers to the processing of personal data in a manner that makes it impossible to identify individuals from them. For example, the data can be rendered down to a general level (aggregated) or converted into statistics so that individuals can no longer be identified from them. The prevention of identification must be permanent and make it impossible for the controller or a third party to convert the data back into identifiable form with the information held by them.

Anonymisation must take into account all reasonably viable methods for converting the data back to an identifiable form. Factors such as the costs of identification, time required to identify the data subjects and available technologies must be taken into consideration in the assessment of the possibility of identification. The controller must also prepare for the eventuality that the passage of time and advancement of technology could weaken the anonymisation.

→ Anonymised data are no longer considered to constitute personal data and are not subject to data protection regulations.

Whether an individual data item can be considered anonymous or not requires case-by-case evaluation. Individuals can be identified by other data than their names. Thus, simply deleting the names and other identifying data will not always render all data in a personal data file anonymous. The collected material can contain detailed information on individuals (e.g. rare diseases or a sufficient amount of different types of data) which makes them indirectly identifiable.

If a controller discloses parts of a data set from which all original, identifiable data items have not been deleted, the resulting material still contains personal data. The processing of such materials remains subject to data protection regulations.

Legal requirement when collecting personal data:

All web pages collect some data about the users, even if the page is just a click-through page only, such as survey. Some examples what kind of data is being collected are internet domain, IP address, information when the website was accessed, type of browser and operating system used and from what site the user came to the survey.

Web forms of any kind collect data, and for example Google Analytics gathers even more data behind the scenes, and so do internet surveys.

The instruments to comply with the law:

If collecting user data of any kind the first thing that is must is to make sure you have Privacy Policy in place. Most of the major jurisdiction globally require that this kind of legal agreement is must, and it must contain certain clauses.

- ➔ USA, for example Californian law requires that the Privacy Policy must be displayed as a standalone document and must detail what kind of information is collected and what is to be done with the information, and who it will be shared with (if anyone).
- ➔ Europe is a party of EU Data Protection Directive 1995 and this directive set out seven principles of data collection:
 - **Notice:** users should be given notice when their data is being collected

- **Purpose:** data should only be used for what you say you will use it for
- **Consent:** user data should not be shared without your users' consent
- **Security:** collected data should be kept secure
- **Disclosure:** users should be informed about who is collecting their data
- **Access:** users should be allowed to access their data and make corrections to any inaccurate data
- **Accountability:** users should have a method available to them to hold data collectors accountable for not following the above principles

If one is based in Europe, the UK, Canada or the USA (as we are in Europe) or collect data from alumnis internationally (as we are), one must comply with these laws and reflect these principles in the Privacy Policy.

It is also a must to comply with the law to make sure that users of the survey are bound by the legal agreement.

The Privacy Policy:

Best method what most of the websites use to display Privacy Policies is to include a link down the bottom of the survey in small writing. Such as:



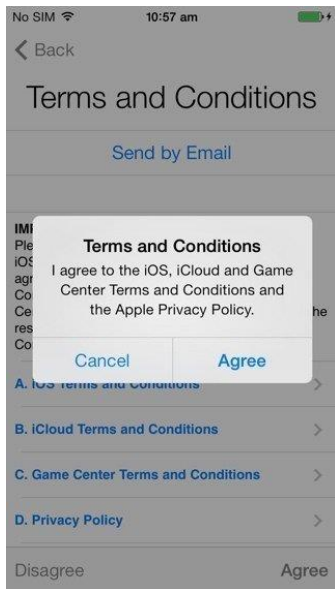
This provides the needed information for the users to be bound by the Privacy Policy. This type of method is called browsewrap. It means that the users need to browse the website to find the terms and be bound by them. Most courts have decided this to be valid enough. If want to use this method one must ensure to display the Privacy Policy in an easy to find place, make it prominent and display it frequently.

Another method is clickwrap, where users have to click "I Agree" or indicate their agreement directly. Most courts have held that this method is better method than browsewrap to get the users agree the Privacy Policy or Terms of Use and to give their consent to be legally bound by it.

To implement a clickwrap method, there are three main ways that you can do it.

First, if you are collecting user data through a mobile app, you can use a pop up when they first open the app which asks them to agree to your Privacy Policy.

Here's an example from Apple:



- ➔ In case of using a website such as survey to collect data, either use a checkbox or the web forms or include a statement saying "By clicking 'Submit' you agree to be bound by our Privacy Policy".

- ➔ Another option is to the statement alongside the "Submit" button, such as:

Using the collected personal data:

In our project the aim is to review the results of survey that outreaches to particular group.

To reach the aim the group has an idea to provide the information for the Tallinn University, therefore it is must to let the people answering the survey know what is being done with the data, particularly if sharing the data with the third party. To avoid issues and problems what may aries with using collected data and as a security instrument it is to make sure that the survey is clear and the only data collected is the data what is needed, nothing more. If in any point the TLU change anything that the data us used for, or share it with any new third party, it must be ensured that it is updated on the Privacy Policy to reflect these changes.

How to use secutiry data:

When holding onto user data it is a must to make sure that the one that collects the data keeps it secure and protected from leaks.

There are two primary ways in which you can keep the data secure: technical security measures, and organizational security measures.

Technical Security Measures

One of the technical ways in which you can protect information is through SSL encryption. SSL means that the connection between your website and the user's browser is secure.

Make sure that you select the option to have SSL encryption turned on wherever possible.



Another way to protect user information is to make sure that your web forms do not allow code to be sent to your database through the form.

(When you receive data through the form make sure that anything that looks like it could be computer code is treated as plain 'text' rather than computer code by your server. That way it won't be run as code on your server, and won't be able to take data from your database.)

Organizational Security Measures

The second way of protecting user data is by implementing "need to know" measures within the Tallinn University. The only people that should have access to user data are those people who need to see it for their work. You can implement passwords and categories of user data through your CRM software to make sure that sensitive user data is protected. The first step toward legally leveraging user data is ensuring that you collect the data legally, and make sure that your users agree to a clear and thorough Privacy Policy agreement. Display this legal agreement using a clickwrap method, so that your users are legally bound by it. Finally, keep data secure and ensure that it is used only for the purposes stated, and not shared with third parties who don't need to see it.

Regulation (EU) 2016/679

- regulates the processing of personal data with the EU and the free movement of such data.
- Important component of EU Privacy and Human Rights law.
- Principles of the directive are aimed at the protection of fundamental rights and freedoms in the processing of personal data.

The data subject has the right to be informed when his personal data is being processed. The controller must provide his name and address, the purpose of processing, the recipients of the data and all other information required to ensure the processing is fair. (art. 10 and 11)

Data may be processed only if at least one of the following is true (art. 7):

- when the data subject has given his consent.
- when the processing is necessary for the performance of or the entering into a contract.
- when processing is necessary for compliance with a legal obligation.
- when processing is necessary in order to protect the vital interests of the data subject.
- processing is necessary for the performance of a task carried out in the public interest or in the exercise of official authority vested in the controller or in a third party to whom the data are disclosed.

- processing is necessary for the purposes of the legitimate interests pursued by the controller or by the third party or parties to whom the data are disclosed, except where such interests are over-ridden by the interests for fundamental rights and freedoms of the data subject. The data subject has the right to access all data processed about him. The data subject even has the right to demand the rectification, deletion or blocking of data that is incomplete, inaccurate or not being processed in compliance with the data protection rules. (art. 12)

Keren + Elias → Researching GDPR (General Data Protection Regulation)

What is the GDPR document?

The intent of GDPR is that all the member states of the European Union have uniform data protection law, which makes the field consistent and more comprehensive. The citizens of the European Union can form an understanding on how their personal data should be protected across the whole European Union. If citizens of the European Union wish, they can take action towards the data processors or file complaints in a consistent manner.

The GDPR is an important legal document that regulates the protection of people, regarding their personal data process and privacy matters. The document was created in 2016 and it came to force at the end of May 2018. All member states of the European Union need to follow the GDPR rules and regulations when they are processing personal data of natural persons. The GDPR document 2016/679 is replacing the old legal document under the name of Data Protection Directive. The regulation was created by the European Parliament and the EU Council together. The legal form of the GDPR document being regulation and not a directive is making it binding and gives some flexibility to the EU member states in regards to applying it and makes the regulation somewhat adjustable. The regulation is applicable to all enterprises that are handling the personal data of natural persons who are located in the EEA area.

Principles of GDPR and the Alumni Engagement and Networking project

Principles of GDPR are stated in several articles, for example Article 6, 4 and 7. One of the most important principles is that the personal information data of individuals cannot be processed if there is no legal reason for it to be processed. This is an important rule that the school institution needs to take into account concerning the LIFE/ELU course project of Alumni Engagement and Networking. In this project there is a survey done and through it answers of natural persons will be collected. When making a survey and analysing it later one needs to know what is accepted and what is not according to the Data Protection Regulation. That is why being familiar with the GDPR document is important. For example, in the questionnaire it needs to be clarified why the collecting and later processing of personal data is required in our research survey so that the answerers know that there is a good legal reason for their personal information to be collected and processed.

Survey and the GDPR

In our project a survey is made which is addressing alumnis of the Tallinn University law School. The alumni students are mostly Finnish and Estonian but also from other European countries or some even from outside Europe. Because the institution is collecting survey data inside the EU the GDPR is binding further actions when making surveys and collecting personal data to be processed. When making the survey, we need to ask for the consent from the alumnis. Do they want to be part of this project and take part in the survey? The GDPR regulations are important here. We need to ask for the alumnis consent to gather, process, and analyse their personal data.

In this project there is a survey done where the alumnis from previous years are asked where they went for postgraduate studies, where they found employment, and how much is their salary now after their graduation from Tallinn University. Information like that falls under the regulations of GDPR, and as such it is important to find out the relevant sections. The institution needs to pay due diligence to processing the gathered personal data as violating the GDPR privacy and security standards has the potential to incur severe penalties in the form of fines and the subjects of data processing may seek compensation for damages if their rights are violated.

Important articles of GDPR to consider

The institution is required to keep a keen eye on the *principles of data protection* which are found in Chapter 2 of GDPR. Important articles are articles 5, 6, 7, 9 and 11. Article 5 concerns principles relating to processing of personal data. Article 6 concerns lawfulness of processing. Article 7 concerns conditions for consent. Article 9 concerns processing of special categories of personal data. Article 11 concerns processing which does not require identification.

Chapter 4 of GDPR is important to consider as well. The University (us) is processing the data and it is the data controller here. As the controller, Article 24 needs to be taken into account. The institution shall implement appropriate technical and organisational measures to ensure and to be able to demonstrate that processing is performed in accordance with this Regulation. Those measures shall be reviewed and updated where necessary. The controller should make sure the Article 32 security of processing is planned.

Consent from the data subjects

Without the consent from data subjects, we cannot process their data at all. When we get the consent we need to also keep the evidence of it according to GDPR. GDPR states that the consent has to be *freely given, specific, informed and unambiguous*. These are the requirements for consent. We need to request consent also in a *clear, plain language* so everyone understands it. The request also has to be distinguished from any other possible requests if there are some. If alumni want to withdraw from the process they can do it whenever they want no matter if they gave consent before.

Privacy rights

According to GDPR data subjects have many privacy rights. In this making of the survey some that are really important and need to be taken into account are: the right to be informed, the right to access, the right to erasure and the right to restrict processing.

Martin → Researching what other universities have done to make and maintain the alumni network

Existing alumni network is looked at, other two Estonian universities which have law faculties - Tallinn University of Technology (TalTech) and University of Tartu as well as how three of the biggest law faculties in Finland have organized their alumni network - University of Helsinki, University of Turku and University of Lapland is examined. Mainly internet and social media is used - Facebook and LinkedIn. Facebook, because it has the widest coverage numerically - meaning the most individuals and it is easy and free to use for everyone. Although it can be said that the aforementioned is the biggest downside of Facebook because the "noise" from other types of content might be uninviting for the professional community. The second platform of the choice - LinkedIn. LinkedIn as a platform was created and is geared towards professional networking and career development. Additionally, many employers in the legal field already use LinkedIn as their main platform for recruiting. Also, information via email from the respective law faculties will be requested.

First we are going to take a look at how the universities in question have coordinated the alumni networks internally - meaning is there an alumni organization specifically for the Faculty of Law, for the school that the faculty of law belongs to administratively or is there a University wide alumni organization meant for all the faculties. As mentioned above I am focusing on the three biggest law faculties in Finland and for the two law faculties in Estonia that offer higher legal education in Estonia.

University of Helsinki Faculty of Law

University of Helsinki has the biggest and oldest of the law faculty in Finland with around 2000 students, about 250 starting every year and with the acceptance rate being around only 5-10 percent. The Helsinki University has a separate university-wide Alumni Community with 45 000+ members making it the largest network of experts in Finland. University of Helsinki has a web based closed Alumni Hub where one can use alumni benefits, have discussions with other alumnis and catch up with one's faculty. Although there is no faculty specific alumni organization, the faculty still has tight cooperation with the alumnis through the Alumni Hub. There is a freshly created (1.4.2022) non-profit association called "Pykälän alumnit ry" which is meant for the Faculty of Law alumnis.

University of Turku Faculty of Law

University of Turku Faculty of Law (UTFL) is the second largest Faculty of Law in Finland with about 1500 students. UTFL has the first alumni organization for law students in Finland - **Senilex ry**⁴ which was founded in 2000. Every graduate from UTFL has the right to become a member of Senilex. Senilex offers alumnis the possibility to maintain the network built during the studies and to get acquainted with older and younger alumnis. Senilex has a tight cooperation with the Faculty of Law and has a mentor program for the current students

University of Lapland Faculty of Law

University of Lapland is the northernmost University in the EU, with the faculty of law having about 1200 students with around 140 new students starting every year. The University of Lapland Faculty of Law (ULFL) has

no separate alumni network. However, it has an appointed contact person for Alumnis. And there is a school-wide Alumni organization for all faculties which one can join through filling a form.

Tallinn Technical University Department of Law

The TalTech Law School is a relatively new law school that has been in existence for about 20 years. There is no official alumni organization for the Department of Law per se. Although alumnis can join the student association of Tallinn Law School (Department of Law) - MTÜ Õigus Juuratudengid (Õigus), as senior members. The School of business and Governance of which the Department of Law is part of has an alumni portal where one can connect with fellow graduates and stay in touch, leverage the shared history you have with other alumni to expand your professional networks and meet new people, create groups (based on class, location, interests) etc. In addition, there is an appointed contact person who is responsible for Partnership and Alumni relations for the School of business and Governance of TalTech.

University of Tartu School of Law

University of Tartu and its School of Law is the oldest of the list being founded in 1632. It offers BA and MA programmes both in Tartu and Tallinn. There is no specific alumni organization specifically for the School of Law. There is a University wide alumni organization, which is the largest in Estonia. It has its own web portal through which an alumni can mentor current students, support the academical work, or can offer practical training employment. Universities can provide its alumnis different types of training, courses or micro degree programs.

It has to be mentioned that, when it comes to the Estonian universities, it is important to note that Estonia (especially Tartu) has a strong culture of (university) student Corporations, which differs from the Scandinavian (Finnish) academical student organizations. Estonian (student)corporations follow mostly old baltic-german corporation traditions. They are all men, or all female organizations, following traditions and rules that might be more than 150 years old. The corporation, by its nature, is a closed organization which above all focuses on its members. The membership of a corporation usually lasts for a lifetime. Although the corporations are interdisciplinary, in a sense corporations take over and carry the function of alumni networks. Corporations have a special place in Estonian academic and cultural history, one of the best examples being the fact that the Estonian national flag (colors) do originate from Estonian Students' Society - the first indigenous Estonian student organization. In 1882 the Estonian Students Society tried to establish itself as the corporation Vironia but it was rejected by other corporations, who were mainly composed of baltic-german students. Their blue-black-white flag was blessed on 4 June 1884 in Otepää, in 1918 this flag was declared as the official Estonian National Flag.

The second part of my review takes a look at the more contemporary way to build and maintain alumni networks and relationships - the modern social media. Out of the dozens of different social media platforms we are taking a look at more specifically LinkedIn and Facebook. Out of those two LinkedIn is purpose built for professional networking. And it can be, by a non-professional observer of course, said that Facebook has been rapidly losing ground to LinkedIn when it comes to professional linking with each other. Although when it comes to alumni communities there might be big and vital communities in Facebook that were created before the LinkedIn's heyday. Additionally, the way these two social networks work, they are not directly competing with each other. Facebook is clearly geared towards casual non-professional communication and LinkedIn on the other hand is solely built for professional communication and building professional networks.

Firstly, the Estonian schools - University of Tartu and Tallinn Technical University. For the Tartu University there is an unofficial group called "TÜ õigus (üldine)", which by the description "gathers students from different

classes to have communication between them". The group has more than 1800 members, but unfortunately it is a private group - meaning that I cannot evaluate the communication taking place in it, but by the general description of Facebook there has been 8 new posts during the last month. That is not much for a group with more than 1800 members, but on the other hand it is likely that there is not much spam, and the posts/discussions are matter-of-fact. In addition, there are numerous smaller groups dedicated for the specific class, some of them having 100+ members, but all of them being private of course. Of course, there is a general Facebook group for the faculty of law, the group has over 2800 members and has content and information posted on at least weekly, such as different events and workshops hosted by the faculty. I did not manage to find a LinkedIn group for the University of Tartu Law alumni's, but there is a general group for University of Tartu alumni, with more than 420 members in it. Additionally, there is an official University of Tartu page with more than 38 000 followers.

When it comes to **TalTech**, the MTÜ Õigus has Facebook page which differs a bit from a Facebook group⁵. The page has almost 600 followers and since it is a page its content is public for everyone. The main content of the page - are the announcements for different events hosted by the TalTech Department of Law or by the MTÜ Õigus. And as it is common with the other schools there are specific smaller groups for the given specific classes. When it comes to the LinkedIn, there is an "Õigus Alumni (Tallinn Law School)" with over 170 members in it and it created for among other things: "to encourage to connect with your fellow alumni and build your professional network." And naturally there is an official LinkedIn TalTech page with more than 18 000 followers.

Thirdly the University of Helsinki, there is a Facebook group called "Pykälän alumnit ry" which according to its description is created for University of Helsinki Faculty of Law alumni "in order to offer a channel through which to effortlessly maintain the friendships created during the studying and to promote wider networking between the different generation of lawyers." The group has almost 200 members. Additionally, there is a general page for the Faculty of Law with about 2800 followers. The official page of University of Helsinki in LinkedIn has more than 136 000 followers with articles and events posted daily. Additionally, there is a smaller affiliate page for Helsinki Alumni with about 440 followers. As for the University of Turku, there is a group for Senilex ry, but it has only five members. Same goes for the LinkedIn where there is a Senilex ry group, although with more members - 150. Additionally, there is a general group for the alumni of the University. Naturally there is an official page for the University with more than 45 000 followers.

Finally, the University of Lapland, despite using more than 20 different combinations of keywords I did not manage to find a Facebook group dedicated to the alumni of the given University. There is a general Facebook page dedicated to the Faculty of Law and another general page for the whole University. The general LinkedIn page of the University of Lapland has more than 14 000 followers.

Conclusion

After examining the alumni networks - the Helsinki University stands out with its dedicated alumni web portal. It is probably due to the fact that the University of Helsinki is clearly the largest of the group in question hence it has the most alumni and of course it has the most financial resources to organize project with this kind of magnitude. When it comes to the alumni network of the Faculty of Law, then the University of Turku with its non-profit organization Senilex Ry, takes the pole position. Although the presence of social media platforms

like LinkedIn can pretty much replace the need for a standalone website/portal. It is highly likely that a very high percentage of the individuals who are interested in networking in the field of law, are already members of LinkedIn and it is even more and more evident by every new fresh class of new legal students. In addition, you have to add the fact that your potential employer can recruit you straight through LinkedIn, where all the relevant data about your studies and work experience is readily available for them. For example, at the moment of writing this review, there are more than 230 jobs with the keyword "legal" available in Finland, and more than 140 jobs in Estonia with the same keyword. When it comes to the developing alumni network of TLÜ, the most cost effective way would be to focus on developing and keeping up an active LinkedIn community. It might need to be assigned a coordinator by the University side, but in my opinion it is more effective, as TLÜ:s resources are probably limited.

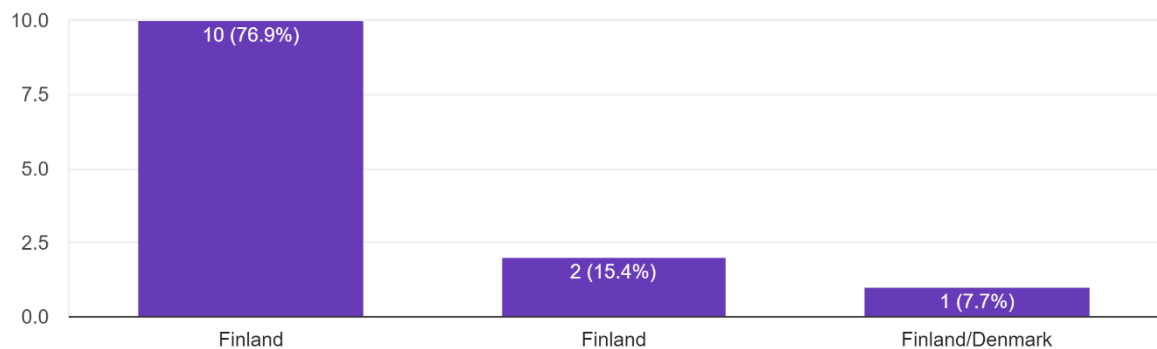

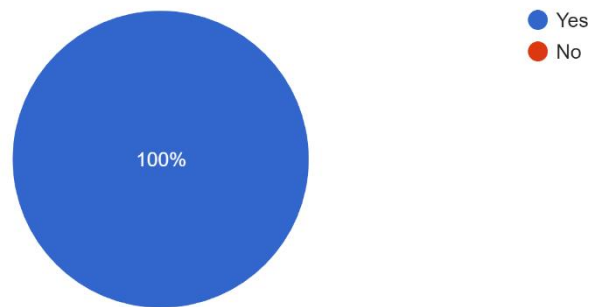

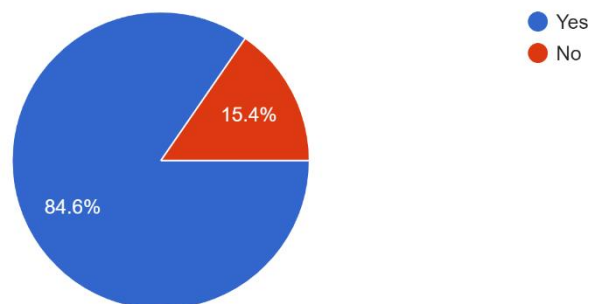

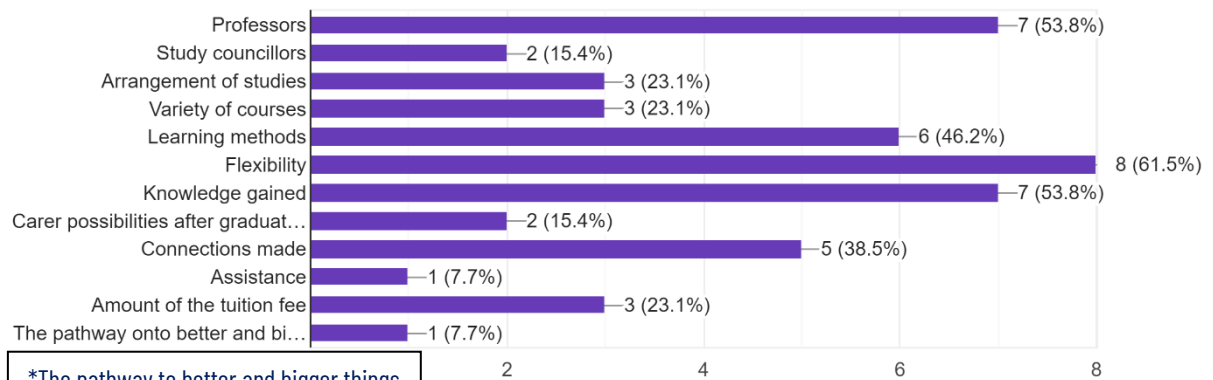

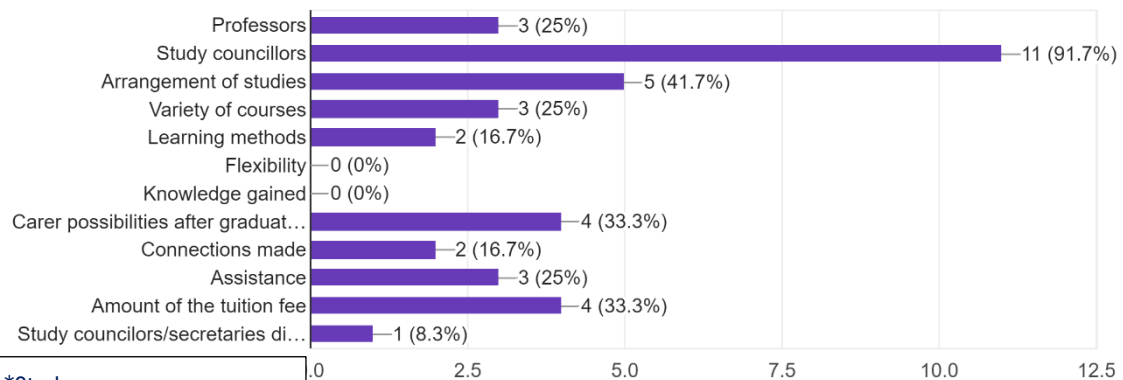

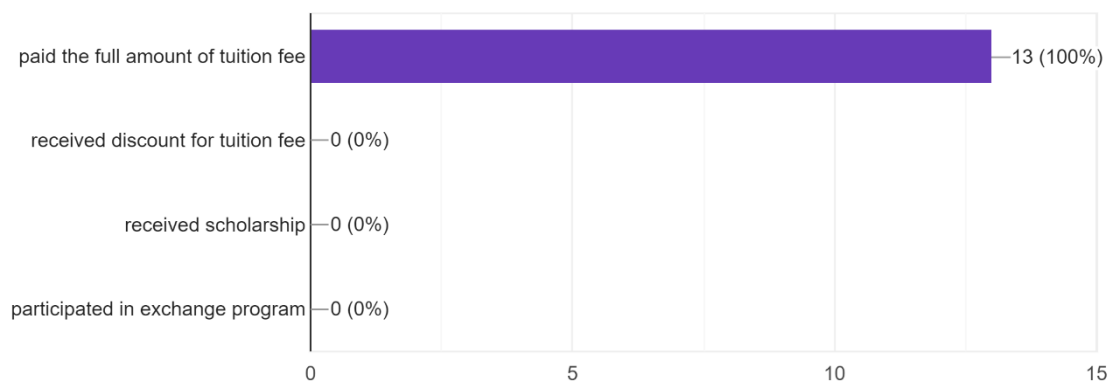

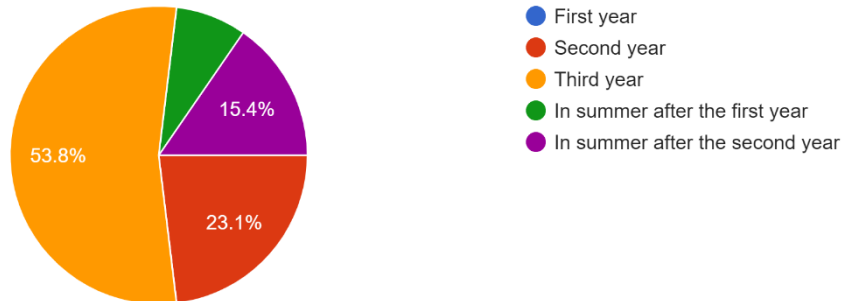

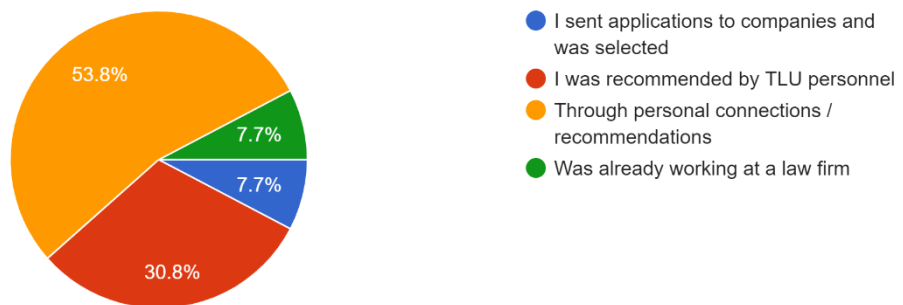
In which year of your studies did you complete practical training?

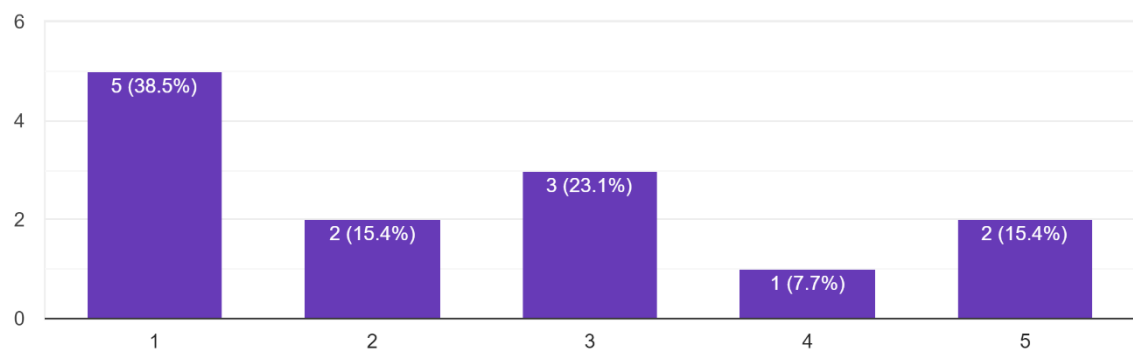

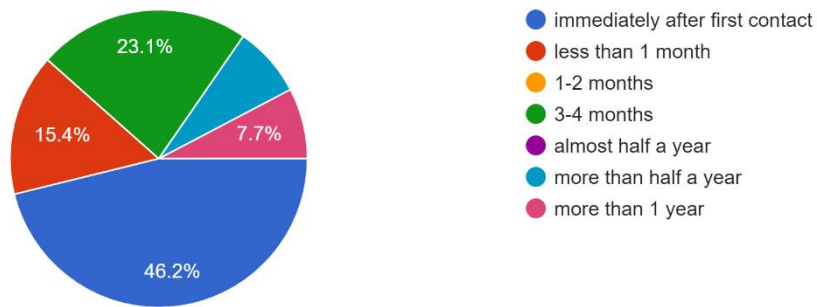

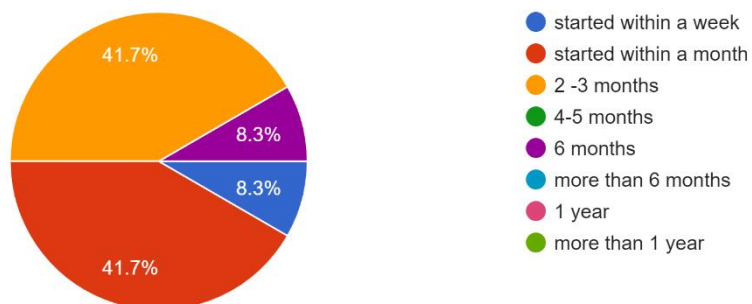

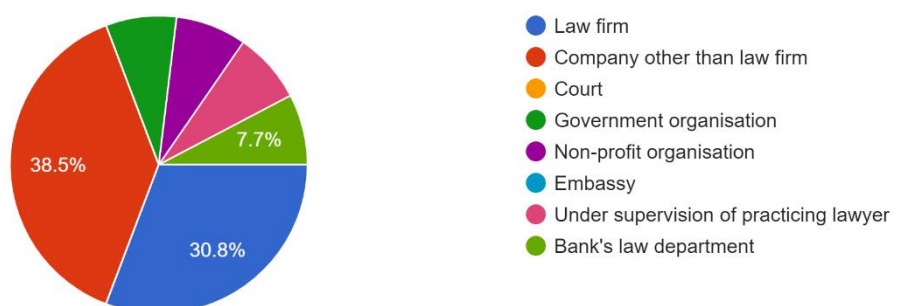

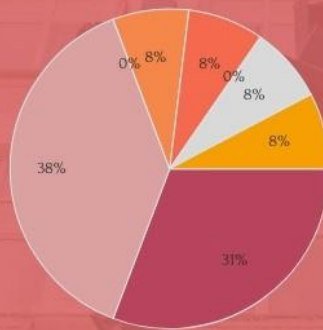

4. self-reflection report about the learning experience of each team member

Law group:

Keren Sarliker: My learning experience of this LIFE group project is very good. I feel like I learned a lot during the project about GDPR, making surveys, personal data collection and being professional in different personal data related questions. Another thing I learned during this Alumni engagement and networking LIFE project is working in an international group with many people from different cultures, knowledge and backgrounds. I feel that our group consisted of people with different strengths and abilities which made the journey a very interesting experience in general. We could help each other in our tasks and support one another. I enjoyed working in this group. What comes to achieving the project goals, in my opinion we succeed well in that. We made an action plan, fulfilled it, did the mid-term report, presented it, completed research and in the end Darta did the portfolio. During the project we all stayed within deadlines and did our assigned parts as agreed. During our project we also helped each other in other university related projects as we are all law students. It was very convenient. Overall, I learned a lot during this project and found it very interesting. Our instructor Phillip Graves was also very supportive during the making of the project.

Dārta Dindune: I learned that management of activities of several members working towards the same aim can be challenging. Not only practical aspects of possibility to meet and discuss the progress of the project takes a lot of time to agree upon, but also constant reminders are necessary. Concerning factual aspects of the project I was able to refresh my communication, research and management knowledge, among learning legal framework surrounding the collection of personal data. While making the survey I was able understand the legal requirements that must be necessary and included in the privacy policy. In the future, I would ask for more teamwork and collaboration to be present.

Tuulia Alopaeus: Gained Experience - When we explained the necessity to do the LIFE Project I was first understanding. But when I noticed what sort of projects there were my understanding vanished. Fortunately, Professor Graves provided us with the Alumni Project to take part in. The gained experience is no different than in any team project. The gained experience in this project was rather social, according to the connections I made with my group when others had not done it. Social Sciences group:

Linda Nurmi: As my only task is to conclude this report I have mostly gained information about the project during our weekly meetings. I learned about teamwork and how important communication in a group is. One person shouldn't do everything, and everybody should be allocated a task. I also learned that making this kind of project, where information is needed in the form of a questionnaire there are so many things to be taken into consideration, for example which platform to use to make the questionnaire.

Henriikka Malmi: Through this project, I learned a lot of different essential things about teamwork and how to manage larger projects as part of a team. It was evident that good planning and communication are essential when working on group projects that require teamwork. Especially with bigger groups, communication is essential. My experience of the project is very

positive due to the well-functioning cooperation among student and project supervisor. As a conclusion, all project steps were diligently taken, and project goals were achieved through great teamwork.

Sirisopa Natreechon: I was the project communicator; I organized meetings and group chats for our project so that we could communicate more effectively. Also, as a team leader alongside Henriikka and Sofia. We had to ensure that all our social science group members received all of the information in case someone missed it. Since a lot of us are working, their schedules on Monday could be unpredictable. I was also one of the people that created the survey questionnaire. The project has given me a different perspective on the types of work you could do after graduation. I get a lot of inspiration and motivation for what I want to do after I graduate. I wish supervisors and developers would, in my opinion, discuss the outcome more in class or on occasion. This type of conversation spreads quickly and would greatly benefit the school. The project was divided into two groups: law and social science. This project taught me the importance of remembering the meeting schedule and committing to the task, especially when the project is completed online.

Sofia Järvinen: For me the main experience through this project has been to learn about all the aspects that need to be considered when completing any type of bigger project. Good planning and staying organized are essential to achieve the goals set. Active communication is also very important. There are certainly a lot of ways of conducting a project that I learned that would be useful to consider in future projects but also other aspects in which different type of approach could be useful. Overall, I feel that we stayed with the schedule and achieved enough for what could be expected from us given that we had less time to complete our project than usually.

Tuuli Kotilainen: I gained some valuable information concerning possible future career possibilities and places to do one's master's degree. In addition, while doing research on social sciences, especially on different types of questionnaires, I learned the diverse styles and aims of conducting a questionnaire. But what was most important to me was the knowledge concerning the possibilities in my future and the alumni connections. I think that new connections in the field I will be working in my future are extremely important and valuable. The project aim was to engage with alumni in a way that we get more information about different possible paths to take after the bachelor's degree in the TLU. In my opinion, we achieved this goal. My part was to create these questions in a way that we would get the information we wanted and thus, the aim of the project would be fulfilled once the questions were answered by the alumni. All in all, this was an interesting study and I think we all got a lot out of it

Rea Huovinen: I learned about teamwork and the importance of communication. I also learned that making this kind of a project, there are so many things to be taken into consideration, for example which platform is more suited for questionnaires, what types of questions are more beneficial etc. In addition to this, I learned that it takes a lot to manage a larger project with a team, and how to communicate with each other in order to stay on top of the task. Good planning is key as well, when working with a bigger group, making sure everyone has been allocated to a task. I gained valuable tools for future projects in life.
